What Are You Seeking After?

Matthew 6:33

So here we are, Christmas has passed and the New Year is upon us. As you reflect on Christmas I just need to ask, did you get what you wanted? What was it that you really wanted more than anything else?

Was it a new television, game console, or computer? Did you want some clothes, shoes, or household goods? Did you hope for some cologne, perfume, jewelry, or some other kind of bling? Maybe your sights were a little higher and you hoped for a new car, vacation, or major bonus. What were you looking to get this past Christmas and did you get it?

And now that the day has passed and the presents have been exchanged and opened, are you satisfied with what you received? Are you grateful? Are you happy? Did these presents give you more joy and contentment in your life? Did you find some level of unexpected fulfillment in the things you gave and received?

Or has it left you a little spiritually vacant and empty? Spiritually poor or bankrupt? Spiritually depleted?

There are many things in this world that we chase after and some of the most fleeting items are those we desire to be given to us in a form of a present or gift. What are you hoping for now that Christmas is over and what are you hoping for out of life in general? Or maybe better asked, what are you seeking after?

Is it something that can be nicely wrapped up and placed under a tree, or given to you at your birthday, or presented to you on some other special occasion? Too often our hearts chase after things that are too far for us to grasp at and in the long run we end up being greatly disappointed with what we are left with; either because it wasn't what we truly wanted, or we realize that it wasn't what we thought we needed, or it just didn't measure up in fulfilling what our hearts longed for in the first place. Many of us have felt this frustration in our lives at some point in time, and now that we know what it feels like to be unfulfilled with disappointed things, we are forced to ponder what it is that we truly seek after or search for in this life.

Let me share a passage with you found in Mark 6 in which Jesus teaches us that we are not to worry about the things we cannot change and the things which we do not presently have. In this passage Jesus tells us that those who are not believers (Gentiles) chase after such various things hoping to find fulfillment of their needs in pursuing the bobbles of this world

In reflection of His statement Jesus says to His followers in verse 32 that God already knows what they need, thus indicating that the followers of God need not vainly rush to find or obtain such things. Then in a moment of great spiritual clarity He says to them further in verse 33, "But seek first His (God's) kingdom and His (God's) righteousness, and all these things (necessities in life) will be added to you." (NASB)

What a profound statement given to us by our Lord and Savior. Here in this passage He reveals that our focus is not to be chasing or seeking after the things of this world, things that we need to eat, clothes for ourselves, and things that aid us in our lives; but to chase after the things of God such as righteousness, His kingdom, and the things that bring Him glory. If we then do that, God will give us that which we

need in return. So we see in God's economy, meaning the way in which He governs thing to happen, that our job as Christians is not to pursue things of this world, but to pursue that which brings Him glory.

Too often many Christians in this world are placing the proverbial cart before the horse when it comes to the needs of life. They want to first seek after that which makes them comfortable, secure, rich, or affluent before dedicating themselves to the work of the Lord.

However, in this simple passage that speaks against worry, what we also find is the order in which God wants us to conduct our lives. An order that says no matter what I have now, no matter where I am socioeconomically, no matter if I have position or power, not matter if I have nothing at all, I will serve the Lord in what I have, in where I am, and in what I am able to do. Meaning that, if we put our God first in all things and His eternal plans are paramount in our lives, then the temporal things of this present life will be either fully met or seen in perspective as unnecessary. That we would come to realize that some of the things we used to chase after in this life are meaningless and that our true joy can only be found in our service to our God and King.

So in this New Year what are you going to dedicate yourself to? What are you going to seek after? What is going to be the order of your life? Will you seek or chase after the things of God? Are you going to pursue His righteousness and His glory so that you will be a conduit of grace and mercy to others? Are you going to put aside the temporal things you are desiring now for the things that are eternal?

This New Year you have a decision to make. You can either go on seeking to find pleasure and fulfillment in the emptiness of this world, or you can find true joy and completion in serving Christ and the mission of the Gospel. What will you do? What will you seek after now? May what you search for be God's eternal favor so that you may know the rich blessings and pleasure of your God this New Year.

Read the Bible in One Year

Last summer, I finished an inspiring project: reading the Bible all the way through, from Genesis to Revelation. You might call this a long obedience in the same direction, to coin a phrase.

The first thing needed was to analyze the situation. How many books and how many chapters were involved in this endeavor? With the help of a few web sites, it turned out that there are 929 chapters in the 39 books of the Old Testament and 260 chapters in the 27 books of the New Testament. That added up to a whopping total of 1,189 chapters. Wow! With 365 days in the year, this means you need to read 3.25 chapters a day to keep on track. Now three to four chapters a day sound a little more doable.

Next, you need a way to keep track of your progress. That's where this handy two-page checklist becomes, well, handy.

Read the Bible in One Year - 3-4 Chapters Pe Cross out the chapter numbers as you read them. Read from any order that the Spirit leads you.

NINE: When you're stressed, float awhile.


TEN: Remember, the Ark was built by amateurs; the Titanic was built by professionals.
