The Unexpected This Christmas

Luke 2:11-14

Have you ever heard the term, "Expect the unexpected?" That is normally in reference to someone who needs to be on guard or on the alert. It is a phrase that helps someone prepare for what may be coming around the corner in the course of daily moment in time. No question about it – life does throw us some curve balls does it not?

Often we are caught experiencing the unexpected events which disrupt the ebb and flow of our existence and, let's face it, if it wasn't for such times, life might actually be a little boring or mundane. These unexpected times of interruption can be a blessing or a curse depending upon the circumstances surrounding the unexpected event as well as the way in which you embrace it.

In Scripture there was an unexpected event in the lives of many Jews two thousand years ago that should have been expected. In particular I want to focus on the passage of Luke in which an angel appeared before the shepherds who were watching over the flock by night.

When this heavenly host presented himself he commanded them to fear not, for he had a special message for them. He then went on to say, "For today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. 'This will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there appeared with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom He is pleased. (NASB)""

What an unusual and unexpected event. The shepherds' lives were supremely interrupted by a great and awesome moment in history and not only was this event unexpected, so was the sign that was given to them. The sign was that the Christ child was going to be wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger. What kind of sign is that?

I'll tell you what: an unexpected sign. It wasn't a sign of pomp and circumstance. It wasn't one filled with grandeur and gold. It wasn't one in a palace with servants. Nope, it was truly unexpected. Our Savior came to us in all humility and submission before the Father who is in heaven. He came to save that which was lost and draw all men unto Himself.

High Court Blocks NY Virus Limits on Houses of Worship

By Jessica Gresko, Baptist Press, November 26, 2020 WASHINGTON (AP) – With coronavirus cases surging again nationwide, the Supreme Court barred New York from enforcing certain limits on attendance at churches and synagogues in areas designated as hard hit by the virus.

The Southern Baptist Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission had filed a friend-of-the-court brief with the high court Nov. 20 in support of an emergency application by Orthodox Jews challenging New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo's "cluster action initiative" intended to combat spikes in new COVID-19 infections.

The justices split 5-4 late Wednesday night, with new Justice Amy Coney Barrett in the majority. It was the conservative's first publicly discernible vote as a justice. The court's three liberal justices and Chief Justice John Roberts dissented.

The Birth of a Hymn

Pastor Al provided this interesting story of how a much loved hymn came to be. It is also an example of how a secular song became a rousing praise to God.

Julia Ward Howe and her husband, Samuel, pitched in to help the Sanitary Commission at the beginning of the U.S. Civil War. As a result of their volunteer work, President Lincoln invited them and some others to Washington.

During that trip, the Howes visited a Union Army camp in Virginia and heard soldiers sing "John Brown's Body," a song celebrating the man who had attacked a Southern arsenal hoping to trigger a rebellion against slavery. One line of the song read, "John Brown's body lies a'mouldering in his grave."

James Freeman Clarke, a clergyman traveling with the Howe's party, knew that Julia was a published poet. He urged her to write some decent words to the tune. By the next day, November 19, 1861, Julia Ward Howe had written her famous lines to the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." She later described how the words came to her:

"I awoke in the grey of the morning, and as I lay waiting for the dawn, the long lines of the desired poem began to entwine themselves in my mind, and I said to myself, "I must get up and write these verses, lest I fall asleep and forget them!" So I sprang out of bed and in the dimness found an old stump of a pen, which I remembered using the day before. I scrawled the verses almost without looking at the paper."

Next February, *Atlantic Monthly* printed Mrs. Howe's poem and paid her \$4.00 for it. The entire nation was inspired by the words when they appeared, and the song became literally the battle hymn of the American republic during the dark days of the Civil War. When the song was sung at a rally attended by President Lincoln, he cried out with tears in his eyes, "Sing it again!"

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After the war, Julia Howe remained active in reform causes as President of the American Woman Suffrage Association and the American Branch of the Women's International Peace Association. In 1907 she became the first female member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters and, we regret to say, preached in Unitarian churches.

When Julia Ward Howe died in 1910, four thousand people attended her funeral at Boston's Symphony Hall. It was a moving moment when those four thousand voices rang out with her song, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Listening Beyond the Stars

The following daily devotion appeared in Our Daily Bread for Oct. 18, 2020. It was written by Dr. James Banks, the pastor of Peace Church in Durham, North Carolina.

Please read Isaiah 55:1-7 before reading this story.

Imagine life without mobile phones, Wi-Fi, GPS, Bluetooth devices, or microwave ovens. That's the way it is in the little town of Green Bank, West Virginia, known as "the quietest town in America." It's also the location of the Green Bank Observatory, the world's largest steerable radio telescope.

The telescope needs "quiet"" to "listen" to naturally occurring radio waves emitted by the movement of pulsars and galaxies in deep space. It has a surface area larger than a football field and stands in the center of the National Radio Quiet Zone, a 13,000-square-mile area established to prevent electronic interference to the telescope's extreme sensitivity.

This intentional quiet zone enables scientists to hear "the music of the spheres." It also reminds me of our need to quiet ourselves enough to listen to the One who created the universe.

God communicated to a wayward and distracted people through the prophet Isaiah, "Give ear and come to me; listen, that you may live. I will make an everlasting covenant with you" (Isaiah 55:3). God promises His faithful love to all who will seek Him and turn to Him for forgiveness.

We listen intentionally to God by turning from our distractions to meet Him in Scripture and in prayer. God isn't distant. He longs for us to make time for Him so He can be the priority of our daily lives and then for eternity.
