From the Pastor's Desk

Answer God's Call

Matthew 10:16-17 "Behold, I send you out as sheep in the midst of wolves; so be shrewd as serpents and innocent as doves. But beware of men, for they will hand you over to the courts and scourge you in their synagogues."

There are many examples in the Bible of people being called by God to carry out God's mission. And they were persecuted as they attempted to carry out that mission. Jesus predicted what would happen as they went.

Can we expect to go about spreading the Good News of hope and eternal life and everybody is going to be happy? A Godly pastor, man of God, will certainly be loved by his congregation and the community. Really? That's not what Jesus told His disciples. Check out this story of America's first foreign missionary AND his wife. He left for the mission field in 1812. (Remember, that's the time of the War of 1812).

Adoniram Judson is often singled out as the first American foreign missionary. This is only partly true. When he sailed for India in 1812, he was but one of four men traveling as Congregational missionaries to the Orient. And his wife Anne was with him.

The credit for evangelizing Burma is as much hers as his if only because she saved his life to carry on the work. Her ability to learn the language greatly assisted his efforts at translation and evangelism and her letters home made their adventures so vivid in the minds of Americans that Judson's name became virtually a household word.

On July 13, 1813, the two laid eyes for the first time on Rangoon, the city where they began their Burmese work. It was "a miserable dirty town," they wrote. The houses were thatched. There was virtually no sewage. Filth flowed into the creeks and was carried off at high tide.

The pair soon discovered that Christian converts would be slow in coming. Christianity was not favored by the king, and so brutal was the despotism of the overlords, that the common people dared not embrace the new faith. It was five years before the Judsons baptized their first convert.

In the meantime, Adoniram preached in a zyat he built in the city. He and Ann mastered the Burmese language and while Adoniram labored to translate the Bible, Ann produced a catechism.

To find words to convey religious meaning, they often had to use another related language. Burmese simply lacked the necessary vocabulary.

Although the Judsons sailed as Congregationalists under the mission board that Adoniram had helped form, in a curious twist he did not remain Congregationalist. During the passage to India, he became convinced that his church's doctrine of baptism was incorrect.

In Calcutta, Adoniram and Ann were baptized by immersion. They immediately broke their connection with the board that sent them and appealed to the Baptist churches of the United States to form a new mission to support them. This became a reality and now there were two missions rather than one, both instigated in part by Judson.

Expelled from India, the Judsons sailed to Burma and opened that work.

In 1824, when England and Burma went to war, Adoniram was imprisoned as a spy. Ann worked night and day for his release. Both suffered greatly.

Judson was hung in torturous positions. Ann lost her health, owing to a difficult labor, a tropical fever, and her exertions to free her husband.

The sickly child did not survive long. Ann died shortly after Adoniram's twenty-one month captivity ended. Afterwards Judson suffered despair-filled depression.

Thirty years after Ann and he first left the United States, Judson returned to his native country for a short visit.

Back in Burma, he soon died. He left behind 7,000 converts. Today the Burmese church has grown to over two million Christians. July 13, 1813, was indeed a fateful day for the Judsons and the Burmese.

Now, with that story, are you ready to answer God's call? Acts 9:16 (Paul's call) "for I will show him how much he must suffer for My name's sake."

It ends with David praising God for deliverance from his son Absalom's rebellion and from a pestilence due to his disobeying God.

The church exterior has been recently painted by a local contractor. If you take notice, the blue exterior doors are now painted red. This is the third major renovation in recent months.

Last November, the parsonage roof was completely renovated with architectural shingles. In May 2024, storm damage to the church roof was repaired with 50-year architectural shingles. In July, the church was repainted.

We have been blessed with the financial resources to complete these projects and thus extend the useful life of these buildings as focal points for spreading the gospel.

A Trio of Baptisms



The Character Building Power of Chores

Some insights by Andrea Gutierrez from *Focus on the Family Magazine* for August/ September 2024]

"Is it clean enough?" This question from Linda's 5- and 7-year-old boys used to bother her. To teach them how to recognize a clean room, she created the Last Thing Game.

Once the bedroom was straightened, her boys would carefully inspect it. When they saw items that still needed to be put away, the game began. The competition was intense, with both boys determined to find one more car, sock, or LEGO block to pick up.

The child who put the last item in its place was declared the winner. The winner was then allowed to choose a reward from the prize drawer, which held inexpensive goodies.

Children of any age can help with chores, even if it is a challenge to get them started. But if you consistently model a job well done, their competence might surprise you.

Chores not only teach children to keep things tidy in the short term but also help them develop valuable character traits and skills in the long term so they will become productive citizens in their community as adults.

There are countless ways that children can help around the house at each age and stage of their development. This can include tasks such as picking up toys and clothes, dusting low furniture, making their beds, washing dishes (carefully!), cleaning up small spills, putting dirty clothes in the laundry, putting away their clean clothes, feeding the cat or dog, and putting out the trash.

Giving your kids routine chores combats entitlement and instills Godly character traits, as well as qualities such as time-management skills, obedience, self-reliance, and even fiscal responsibility.
