From the Pastor's Desk

Last month, we addressed the reasons a person might have for skipping out on church attendance. I promised back then that we'd address reason #4: "The church has nothing to offer me (that I can't get anywhere else)." For instance, someone might say (and many have) that they can worship God alone, or on a walk through the woods, or while fishing on a lake. I also posed the question, "Could Jesus himself say 'The church has nothing to offer me.""

Read the New Testament and you'll see that Jesus would wholeheartedly agree with the idea that you could worship God alone, or on a walk through the woods, or while fishing on a lake. In fact, it's safe to say he did all those things. I have no doubt he would encourage us to worship God in all those circumstances and more.

Yet, Jesus was in the Temple or a synagogue for worship every Sabbath, as far as we can tell! So the issue is NOT either-or, but both-and.

If anyone in all of human history could legitimately say, "I'm so spiritual and wise and close to God that the church has nothing more to offer me" it would be Jesus Christ, the Son of God!! Yet, Jesus was in the Temple or a synagogue for worship every Sabbath!

If you aren't in a Christian church every Sunday with Biblical preaching and teaching, and fellowship with like-minded Christians where you can support each other in living the Christian life, and opportunities to serve God and others, then I can see only two possibilities for you if you want to follow Jesus' example.

Whatever the reason, <u>finding the right church is</u> <u>important enough to spend however many weeks</u> <u>or months it takes to find it</u>. Don't just try one or two and then give up if you haven't found it.

Secondly, if you are so spiritual, so wise, so close to God, and so knowledgeable about the Bible that you can't find ANY church that does anything for you, then you have <u>only one option</u>. You have to start your own church and share your spirituality, wisdom, love and knowledge of the Bible with people in your community who desperately need what you have.

If you do that, you will then have something you have been missing: you will have the satisfaction of effectively serving God and making the world a much better place. THAT is something you can't get by worshipping God on your own in private! (Hebrews 10:24-25): And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Share Your Faith

In this devotion from *Our Daily Bread*, read Acts 16:1-10 and then read this commentary by ODB writer Bill Crowder. It's about the Macedonian who called the apostle Paul in a vision with "Come over to Macedonia and help us."

In 1701, the Church of England founded the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in order to send missionaries around the globe. The motto they chose was transiens adiuva nos—Latin for "Come over and help us!"

This has been the call on gospel ambassadors since the first century, as followers of Jesus take the message of His love and forgiveness to a world in desperate need of it.

The phrase "come over and help us" comes from the "Macedonian call" described in Acts 16. Paul and his team had arrived at Troas on the west coast of Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey, v. 8). There, "Paul had a vision of a man of Macedonia standing and begging him, 'Come over to Macedonia and help us'" (v. 9).

Having received the vision, Paul and his companions "got ready at once to leave for Macedonia" (v. 10). They understood the vital importance of the call.

Not everyone is called to cross the seas, but we can support those who do with our prayers and finances. And all of us can tell someone, whether
